

- 7. FREEMASONRY AND WOMEN: In Freemasonry, as in all other areas of life, women play an important role. The opportunities for women to participate in Freemasonry are widespread and meet a variety of needs, from social interaction in the Orders for both men and women, to the unique needs met in the "women only" Masonic-related organizations. The moral and ethical values that Freemasonry encourages are universal and not gender-based. Masonic Lodges maintain today a long-standing tradition of restricting membership in Freemasonry to men. This tradition is based on the historical all male membership of stonemasons guilds. During the Middle Ages, men traveled far from home and lived in lodges while constructing great cathedra Is throughout Europe. However, in the middle 1800s the fraternity took the progressive step, for that time, of creating organizations that included women, so that men and women could share Masonic fraternalism. The Order of the Eastern Star (the largest of these Masonic-related groups) was established in 1855, the Order of the Amaranth in 1873, and the White Shrine of Jerusalem in 1894. Two national Masonic-related youth organizations are for young women: the International Order of Job's Daughters, founded in 1920, and the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, founded in 1922. Rainbow and Job's Daughters are involved with local charities, community services, and educational programs. Other Masonic-related organizations limit their membership to women only, such as the Ladies Oriental Shrine of North America, Daughters of the Nile, the Daughters of Mokanna, and the Social Order of Beauceant. These Masonic-related organizations, like many organizations in North America, both social and professional, base their membership on gender, Junior League, P.E.O., National Association of Female Executives, and Girl Scouts, for instance, are organizations created exclusively for women, established to fulfill their unique interests and specific needs.

- 9. MASONIC TEMPLE MAKES COVER: I was researching old copies of the Masonic Messenger and found a copy from October 1973. The cover of the magazine was a photo of the Masonic Temple in Augusta (1/6<sup>th</sup> owned by Webb Lodge). Thought all the brethren might enjoy seeing it:



Inside of the Messenger was an article entitled: "Freemasonry in Augusta." The cornerstone and dedication ceremonies were conducted by the late M.W. Brother Raymond B. Muse, Grand Master of Masons in Georgia, before a large assemblage on July 13<sup>th</sup>, 1968. This will be a series of articles in the next few months explaining in detail how the formation of the Masonic Temple occurred. Some of the information will be summarized by me due to its length. In the early 1820's Freemasonry was progressing to such a point that the members felt that a Masonic Hall should be erected in Augusta as a permanent meeting place for the several Masonic Institutions. In 1824 a group of the brethren petitioned the General Assembly of Georgia for permission to hold a Masonic Lottery in Augusta for the purpose of raising sufficient funds to erect a Masonic Hall. This petition was granted and the lottery was held in 1825. When the necessary funds were raised, the Lottery Commissioners petitioned the General Assembly of Georgia to create a

corporation to be know as "The Trustees of the Masonic Hall in the City of Augusta" and charged the corporation with the responsibility of providing a suitable and convenient meeting place for the several Masonic Institutions existing in Augusta at that time to include: Social Lodge No. 18, Webb's Lodge No. 19, Georgia Encampment No. 1, R.A.M.; Adoniram Council No. 1, R.&S.M. and The Consistory of the Sublime Degrees. The cornerstone of the first Masonic Hall in Augusta was laid on June 2, 1828, with Grand Master William Schley presiding. Several sentiments were given, and the following I thought was one that was appropriate at the time and I wish that it was still appropriate but unfortunately it is not and is the reason for the why the trustees are investigating the sale of the building: To the Masonic Hall of Augusta----May it long be the abode of "friendship, morality, and brotherly love." In the early 1830's the result of the Morgan incident caused the loss of membership in Social and Webb's Lodge and the few remaining members of Webb's decided to give up their charter and affiliate with Social Lodge, it being the oldest. In the late 1840's Social Lodge began to increase in membership and decided to appeal to the Grand Lodge of Georgia to revive the late Webb's Lodge #19 in 1851. It was not approved so in late 1851 several members petitioned to form a new lodge to be known as Webb's Lodge #166 which was granted in 1852. For some reason not known the apostrophe was dropped from the name in the 1890's and was known as Webb Lodge #166. (To be continued next month)
