Association of North America and written by Thomas K. Sturgeon, RWGM, Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania) For the last one-half century, membership in Freemasonry has continued to decline. Our fraternity has lost approximately 66% of its members during that period. To solve this issue requires a need for change that makes the fraternity more contemporary to 2011 than to a past era, say 1911. But, to make this level of needed change requires courage, most especially from the East. It also takes patience, tolerance and flexibility from the general membership. **SOLUTIONS: 1.)** Membership Process; Some Grand Lodges still do not permit a member to invite a good and decent man to join, instead still depending on the ancient and archaic policy of requiring an interested man to ask. Truth be told, many Masons have not adhered to this policy anyway, so why not permit what has already been an "Underground" practice. If we expect our membership numbers to rise, this practice must change. Many good men never join our fraternity because they never know that they had to ask. This change has been authorized in the state of Pennsylvania. The state of Pennsylvania has recently held a one day class in 13 different locations throughout the state and added thousands of new



brethren to their rolls. These types of classes should not be conducted on a regular basis; probably no more frequent than once every five years. This is a valuable membership development tool that allows many good men to become Masons who just cannot join the lodge in the traditional manner. Many detractors of this idea say that these members come in one

door and go out the other. Proof is in the states of Ohio and Pennsylvania; the opposite is true. The majority of these brothers continued their Masonic education in appendant bodies and went on to become officers in their lodges. Also we need to change the voting process to protect a decent man from being rejected because someone does not like his recommender or for some other non-Masonic reason. The time has come to require more than one blackball and if there is only one blackball, he must explain his reason to the District Deputy in total confidentiality his reasons for that blackball and the District Deputy would have the authority to uphold or reject the blackball following a thorough investigation. **2.)** Gaining membership is one problem; another is

getting brothers to the meetings both regular and called. How do we do this? How about asking those who do not attend. Call them up and ask them why? Equally important is to ask what active members think of the meetings. I have been told that brothers want to attend meetings not only for fellowship but to learn something, for the meetings to be more social, shorter, less ritualistic and provide an opportunity to listen to an interesting speaker. More brothers do not want to hear the minutes, bills etc. That is one reason why the Scottish Rite



has had a 35%-45% increase in attendance the last 4 years. We do not always have tiled meetings, have interesting guest speakers and involve the families, especially the spouses of the membership. I also think that it is appropriate to relax the attire. While jeans and t-shirts should not be permitted, neither is a suit and tie required. 3.) Courage to change also means that the ritual should be available to each Director of Work in each lodge. Do we not trust each other enough to keep this information private? Just go to your computer and "GOOGLE" degrees of freemasonry and anyone can come up with all the information available to our District Custodians. We need to be able to do more efficient and accurate work. 4.) We need to be more aggressive in dispelling the misinformation about our fraternity. We must become more transparent, while at the same time maintaining our privacy. We need to have open houses in our lodges, march in parades, visibly help in community projects (blood drives, habitat for humanity etc) and generally let our neighbors know who we really are, what we stand for and the good that we do (advertise ourselves). If we can do this it will be our best Membership Development Tool. CONCLUSION: To do nothing and expect better results will not solve our problems. All of these changes, and a myriad of other changes, must occur if we expect to be a significant fraternity in the future. Webb Lodge's membership in 1988 (when I became Secretary) was 337; I am still the Secretary 23 years later and the membership is now 97. This should cause all of us to pause. As leaders of this greatest of fraternities, we need to ask ourselves and our brothers, "Are we doing all the right things

today to assure there is a future Masonic Fraternity, including one for those Masons yet to be born." The time to change is now and no change will take place unless there is **Courage in the East.** I challenge our current Worshipful Master, Past Masters and Future Worshipful Masters to meet this challenge, think out of the box and do the right thing.
