5. FROM SANTA'S WORKSHOP: "Daddy," she said, her eyes full of tears, Will you talk to me and quiet my fears? Those bad boys at school are spreading a lie about the impossibility of reindeer that fly. There is no Santa Claus, they say with a grin there is not one now and there never has been. Her Daddy looked at her questioning face and puffed his pipe while his frantic mind raced. He had put this off as long as he could, he had to think fast and it better be good. Whispering a prayer, he began with a smile. "Well climb on my lap, dear, let's talk awhile. 6. THE THREE LESSER LIGHTS: (Bro. Stoney) What do you really know about the Three Lesser Lights? We are told



they are arranged in triangular form about the Holy Altar and represent the sun, moon, and worshipful master. Over time we come to know they are always lit when the lodge is opened and extinguished when it is closed. Nowhere in our ritual are we told why we have them, how they came to be, or what their secret symbolic meaning might be beyond the fact they appeared in printed references in the 17th Century, which adds almost nothing to our understanding of their meaning. I believe they are one of the symbols in Freemasonry that a brother is supposed to translate for himself, getting as much from

the lesser lights in direct proportion to the amount of labor and thought his is willing to devote to the process of examining their meaning. Different Masonic jurisdictions place the lesser lights in a variety of locations upon the lodge floor. What is common is that they are arranged in triangular form about the altar; what is different is the shape and size of the triangle. That there are three lights by definition dictates they will be either triangular or a straight line. Why not have two or four lights? Most Masons will immediately recognize the significance of the number three. We have three degrees, three steps, three ancient grand masters, etc. Three is also the numerical symbol for God. Please note the symbol three for God predates the concept of any Trinitarian doctrine. It comes from the triangle which is the first possible figure made from straight lines. The triangle has no loose ends and is without beginning or end, which concisely defines God. Sun worship was among the very first religions and predates recorded history. It was only natural that early worshipers would place a light beside their altar or holy place and name it for the sun. Ancient peoples made much of sex. Their primary impulses were self-preservation and mating followed closely by protection of children. It naturally followed that they would believe that the great shining god in the sky would also have a mate, especially when the mate was so plainly evident, i.e., the moon. With a father and mother, it naturally follows there would be a child. Ancient peoples saw the earth's nearest planet, Mercury, as that child, the one the God kept closest to him. Thus explains the origin of the three lesser lights in the earliest recorded accounts of the mysteries of Eleusis. Albert Pike asserted that Masonry "absurdly substituted" the Master of the Lodge for Mercury. Pike also said each Mason is free to interpret our symbols for themselves. The sun does give light and rules the day giving life. The moon, on the other hand, is not necessary for the night however, our ancestors, not understanding celestial matters, ascribed all manner of weird and wonderful powers to the moon, like witches, dogs baying at the moon, evil preferring the dark, etc. So the moon, like the sun, played an important role in ancient man's life and religion. That the Master of the Lodge is included as a lesser light is quite logical to most Masons. His duty is to rule and govern the lodge with regularity and dispense light to the Craft which is spelled out in his oath to "set the craft at labor under good and wholesome instruction..." Whether he dispenses light is another issue, that it is his duty, is without question. We still say the words because they are old. As the illumination of the Three Lesser Lights allows us to see, examine, understand, and live by the three Greater Lights, so light from the East, as provided by the master, gives each brother the opportunity to see, examine, understand and live by the great principles of fraternity and brotherhood.
